"Roy"al Memories Chatting with a 'Spot of Tea'

After the birth of Prince Louis of Cambridge, England awaits the second royal wedding in almost a decade. Many of us plan on tuning in to watch the big event; including Roy, a fellow Englishman and former member of the Royal Protection Force. "Wherever the Queen went, we went. It was never boring," recalled Roy when he and the other officers would travel the world with the Royal Family. Their travels included far away places such as Africa, Australia, New Zealand and of course, the rest of Europe. Roy would not only accompany members of the Royal Family on their travels (including the Queen's private holidays on the beach), but even during their trips to public settings, including restrooms. An officer would stand outside the door and not let anyone in

while waiting for "the royal flush."


As a teenager, Roy originally wanted to be a mechanic. However, his father, a Royal Navy Commander, had other plans for the young lad to also join the military. Not at all comfortable with the idea, Roy decided to become a policeman instead. He applied for a job with the Metropolitan Police, where he was eventually stationed at Buckingham Palace. The job proved to have its challenges in rain or shine. In fact, one of Roy's first assignments was to stop traffic in pouring rain while waiting for the royal car to exit the palace gates. "I felt like a drowned rat," said Roy. As soon as the royal car pulled up to him, however, the window rolled down and two pieces of candy were placed into Roy's hand. He was later informed by his boss that it was the Queen Mother who performed the kind deed. "She likes you. I think she was upset that you were standing there in the pouring rain," the boss said. That moment motivated Roy to apply for a position in the Royal Protection Force where he later met the Queen's private secretary, who would introduce him to the Queen herself. When the time came to meet her Royal Highness, Roy lost his nerve. "My legs froze," he recalled. When he shook the Queen's hand, he curtsied instead of bowed. "I thought, 'That's it. I'm dead," said Roy. But the secretary kindly assured him that the Queen would not remember his mistake because she met too many people.

When assigned his duties, Roy was told to be respectful to all members of the palace, even the maids and janitors. In public, officers were very discreet about their actual occupation to protect the queen and her family. They wore long trenchcoats to cover up their weapons even in 90 degree weather. People would make ignorant comments about the officers, but all one could do was to "ignore them and walk on." On his days off, Roy would spend hours in the palace gardens. The throne room was the most beautiful, with pure gold everywhere. With twelve years of living at Buckingham Palace, Roy looks forward to life at St. Joseph's Home. We enjoy his company as well, especially over a traditional "spot of tea."

Our Vocation and "The Phantom"

As you can see on our front page, we were privileged to have Franc D'Ambrosio – also known as the *Iron Man of the Mask* - one of the longest running Broadway Phantoms of the Opera, perform at our Gala. It was a stellar performance; we were in awe of his talent, his voice range and his kindness.

The evening was elegant in every way. It was the centerpieces that first drew my attention – they set the theme. They also reminded me of the essence and beauty of our vocation. There were burning candles in lovely candelabras entwined with deep red roses and with the signature phantom mask leaning against them; all of this was placed on carefully arranged sheet music.

Indeed, these centerpieces could well stand for the theme of our vocation. There is light and beauty and sacredness: the candles, the roses, and the music.

The sheet music also reminds us that the melody for each of our lives is different – we all dance to a different beat. Some can jive, some can only shuffle, and whatever the dance of life is, it's so much better together: young and old, fast and slow, often leaning on each other.

Finally we come to the mask: Old age can try to put a mask on people, sometimes it is a mask of frailty, a mask forged by the burdens life can impose, or by a society that disregards the value of the elderly. For Little Sisters, it is a gift and unique privilege to unmask the beauty of each one whom we welcome into our Home. We truly have a magnificent vocation.

And sometimes God seems to wear a mask. We have to really search for him, and we don't always recognize God when we're trying to make ends meet. But the Sisters will tell you, we actually do recognize Him. We see God's unveiled face in the benefactors we approach week after week, in those responding to the mailings we send out time and time again. You hear us say, "could you please spare some

fruit, or some nice fish for our Residents; could you please help us pay our bills...again?" And you always do! Behind the masks of so many faces, we truly see God's face shining through!

Now, some of you might be tempted to put on a mask when you see us coming and hope that we don't recognize you! But we always do!

In the Bible we read that Moses had to mask his face because of its blinding radiance after he looked upon God. I think I could say that about all of you our good friends, and you, our wonderful Priests and Religious, and you, our beloved elderly Residents, and you our dedicated Little Sisters. We've all seen God when we try to help each other and we all come away a bit more radiant. Thank you for putting on the face of Christ for us.
