## **Pro Fidelitate et Virtute Award**

### The Daughters of Jeanne Jugan

A record-breaking late spring snowstorm couldn't dampen the spirits of the full house at the Institute of Religious Life (IRL) National Meeting at the University of St. Mary of the Lake in Mundelein. The theme was 'Forming Apostles For Today'.

During the Saturday evening banquet on April 27th, we were humbled to be honored with the Pro Fidelitate et Virtute Award. This IRL award honors those "who manifest a strong love for the Church and a zealous commitment to the consecrated life."

The evening began with Mass celebrated by the Apostolic Nuncio, Archbishop Christophe Pierre. We were especially touched by Archbishop Pierre's love for Jeanne Jugan and his reference to us as his 'Sisters'. He explained that his home region in France (Brittany) is the same as where Jeanne Jugan lived and where our Motherhouse has been for over 160 years.

On behalf of all the Little Sisters, Sr. Constance Veit thanked the IRL for our award. She spoke of our unwavering faith in Divine Providence and how God has not only provided for our needs, but also protected us in difficult and even dangerous times.

Through many months of preparation, Little Sisters, Residents and volunteers made over 300 rosaries to hand out that evening to each guest. Mother Provincial Maria Christine recounted stories of Residents and Little Sisters learning to make rosaries, finding beads and lovingly stringing them together. She asked that when the rosary was recited on these beads that the intention of vocations for the Little Sisters be offered in prayer.

With God's grace and your help, we hope that new generations of Little Sisters will be serving the needy elderly for many, many years to come!

# A Celebration to Remember Amazing Grace Gala

150 years ago, seven Little Sisters arrived in America to care for the needy elderly. We planned a special Amazing Grace Gala (our largest annual fundraiser) for this milestone anniversary at the beautiful Sanfilippo Estate in Barrington Hills. The Estate is home to the world's largest collection of automated musical instruments, most built at the end of the 19th century.

When those first Little Sisters arrived, it was a very different America than we live in today. There were no automobiles, refrigeration or electricity. We hoped that our guests would enjoy the opportunity to relive that early time by touring the collection of music and other antique

machines of the late 1800's to early 1900's at the Estate. Little did we know that when they arrived at the Sanfilippo Estates for our Amazing Grace Gala on June 30th that they would also relive the experience of no electricity as well.

Shortly before our event, a major thunderstorm swept through the area. A tree was up-rooted, laying on its side in the parking area. The pavilion where dinner was to be served and the main Estate that houses over 2,000 music machines, nickelodeons, steam engines, clocks, and arcade machines went dark.

A call for prayers was made to the Little Sisters who were getting ready to leave for the Gala. They put a statue of St. Joseph in the window facing the storm and began to pray. Sr. Mary Timothy (on her electric scooter) raced to the chapel. The Lord had inspired over 350 guests to attend our sold out Gala, but without power it couldn't be held. Positioned in front of the altar, Sr. Mary Timothy looked up at the crucifix and pleaded "Jesus, won't you please help us?"

At 5:00, just when we were going to cancel the event, the power went back on. As if the choirs of angels had burst forth with answered prayers, music machines began playing their melodies, as cheers rang out among the guests.

Mother Margaret Charles spoke to our guests recounting the journey of the first Little Sisters' arrival in America. She talked of their faith, courage and reliance on the generosity of their friends and benefactors. Sr. Maria Lourdes and Sr. Amy Kristine joined Mother on stage (dressed in the old habits that those first Little Sisters wore) "As we commemorate the 150th anniversary of the Little Sisters arrival in the US, we can look back and see that we have evolved in many ways, but our work is the same. We still care for the elderly in need, and we still rely heavily on our friends. This anniversary is a time for us to thank you for helping us to keep our work alive and well."

What looked like a disaster turned into a lovely celebration. We are very grateful for the patience (no one complained) and generosity of our guests. This will truly be an evening we will remember.


