In the midst of this coronavirus outbreak we are thinking outside the box to make sure social suffering isn't happening here. Jeanne Jugan focused her life on "Making the Elderly Happy" and we do our best in any situation to follow her footsteps.

Keeping everyone safe may require a 6' foot distance and no group gatherings, but we can still have fun! Individual tables are set up in each Resident's room doorway where they can eat their meals. Smiles and waves send greetings across the hallways. Conversation may be a little louder, but we are adapting. Our Activity Staff leads sing-alongs from a portable keyboard.

St. Patrick's Day was more subdued than years past, but the Irish spirit still shone through. We still feasted on a corned beef and cabbage dinner with Irish soda bread, as our Lucky Leprechaun danced through the hallways. Mother Margaret was close behind ready to pour us some delicious "Irish Coffee."



A computer, mounted on a rolling stand, is loaded with the IN2L (It's Never Too Late) program. IN2L allows us access to email or skype to keep in touch with family and friends.

Mass and prayer groups are very limited, so we brought the Lord and a relic of St. Jeanne Jugan to our Residents with a Eucharistic Procession through the hallways. Along the way, we prayed the rosary and asking for the protection of all here and for all of you! Our chaplain, Fr. Damien, blessed each Resident and



employee along the way.

The Little Sisters first arrived in America speaking very little English during an outbreak of cholera and a series of recurring epidemics of Typhus, Scarlet Fever, and Yellow Fever. They rolled up their sleeves and got to work, spreading a wave of charity throughout America. Finding ourselves in similar circumstances today, we're rolling up our sleeves, striving to provide the highest quality of care in a loving, happy Home, trusting that St. Joseph will protect us.

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RESIDENT HONORED

Ever since she was a child, JoAnn Carroll knew she was adopted, and loved her family very much. It wasn't until two years ago when her children bought JoAnn a DNA test as a Christmas present, that she discovered who her birth parents were, changing her life in the most unexpected way. The results of this test didn't lead her to meet her biological parents, but their many wonderful children.

After completing the DNA test on ancestry.com, JoAnn sent an email to her newly found relatives, just wanting to learn about her biological family. What she received was an eager phone call from a sister letting her know she's the oldest of 5 kids and urging her to come meet them all in California. Through her new found family's generosity, JoAnn traveled with her kids and cousins to meet her birth mother's children; Bobbi, Leslie, Lisa, and David; her birth mother's sister, Betty Ann; and her birth father's child, Kathleen. They greeted her like she was already family with wide open arms, and they put on a giant family party where she met nieces, nephews, husbands, and wives.

When JoAnn saw the faces of her newly discovered family, she couldn't believe her eyes. "It was so nice to finally see people who looked just like me; meeting Kathleen was like looking in a mirror," JoAnn said. After meeting family in California, she headed to Albuquerque, New Mexico to meet the rest of her birth father's 3 kids. Here, she learned the whole story of how her mother had to give her and another sibling up in order for them to live a better life. They both feel so blessed to be here today and have not one, but two families to call their own.

Another miracle of this whole experience is that JoAnn had lost the last of her siblings she grew up with, the same year she had the blessing of meeting her new family. Now they keep in touch via phone and email quite frequently, and JoAnn has found a part of herself she didn't know she was looking for.

We are blessed to have JoAnn as a member of our St. Joseph's Home family and we are so thankful that her mother chose life.

Staying Connected in Social Distancing

Several years ago, a summer heat wave of historic proportions settled over Europe, leading to the death of over 14,000 people in France alone. Many of the victims were elderly citizens who were left behind in major cities as their families and neighbors enjoyed their summer holidays far from the country's urban areas.

The memory of this tragedy has been very present to me as we hunker down, close our doors and try our best to isolate our elderly Residents from the coronavirus for as long as it takes to protect them from danger.

I am confident that our Residents will receive the best care possible no matter how long this emergency lasts, but I worry about the thousands of seniors who live alone out in the community. Let's not allow what happened in France to happen here.

Even as we practice prudent social distancing, we need to find ways to stay connected to our seniors even without having direct, face-to-face contact. Here are a few suggestions.

Many seniors are not skilled at social media, but they do use the telephone! Call at least once a day to make sure the elders in your life are well and have what they need. Just knowing someone cares about them will help sustain their spirits.

Make sure the seniors in your life have the food and medications they need. If you need to avoid direct contact, you could drop purchases off on their doorstep. You might even drop off some home-cooked meals, or invite your senior friends to make



you something if cooking is not your forte!

If the seniors you know are interested in using social media, offer to help them set it up.

For seniors who own a pet, offer your services as a dog walker. Finally, don't forget the spiritual needs of your senior friends and loved ones!

As I write this, many churches have locked their doors and bishops are exempting parishioners from Sunday Mass. But for many seniors, spirituality is a prime source of strength and solace, especially during trying times.

Let the parish staff know about seniors who are homebound or hospitalized and who may need pastoral care. Ask if it's possible to bring them Holy Communion, or if a priest could visit them to give them the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

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We began Lent with the imposition of ashes and the reminder, "Dust thou art and unto dust thou shalt return." None of us could have predicted how quickly we would become so focused on the finiteness and fragility of human life – this is one of the spiritual lessons of the coronavirus.

During this difficult period, we are also learning lessons of patience, interdependence and human solidarity.

The elderly have learned



these lessons through a lifetime of experience. Many of them lived through the Great Depression, World War II and the Korean conflict; the youngest retirees came of age during the war in Vietnam. Personal sacrifice and mutual assistance were lessons they learned growing up in tough times.

Our elderly Residents are witnessing to these values in the midst of our current trials as we do everything we can to protect them from the coronavirus. Together with them, we are praying for a quick end to the pandemic and for all those who are laboring to fight it.


