are the merciful, blessed are the pure of heart, blessed are the peacemakers, and blessed are those who suffer persecution.

The words of Pope Emeritus Benedict at Jeanne Jugan's Canonization inspire us each day, "May St. Jeanne Jugan be for elderly people a living source of hope and for those who generously commit themselves to serving them, a powerful incentive to pursue and develop her work!" Welcome Rohi



Our newest Resident Rohi, has quite the tale to share with us. Having lived the majority of her life in Iran, she endured many hardships, including the Iranian revolution. Coming from a family of thirteen, she married at sixteen, and was living a good, humble life. The Revolution was a shock to her and her family.

Rohi's husband was sentenced to 9 months in prison for being Christian, and having a job with ties to the United States. While he was in prison, Rohi was left alone under house arrest. Each of their children had already fled Iran to the US. When her husband was released, they decided that they would leave too. They each packed a suitcase and fled to Austria. Finally obtaining visas, they arrived in Chicago in 1988. Unfortunately, only eight years after the move, Rohi's husband passed away, but she wasn't left alone this time, because Rohi had her family.

Her children were a great support. After her husband died, Rohi got a condo near her grandkids. Rohi cooked them Persian meals every day, a favorite being eggplant stew. She was such an amazing cook that she never needed to measure anything or follow recipes. To preserve her recipes, her family decided to record her, much like a cooking show, allowing her creations to live on forever.

Living at our Home, her struggles are few. Having such a tough life makes you wonder, how did Rohi, this sweet little lady, get through such struggles? Well, according to her son, her motto has always been "pray and smile." And that she does! We love that motto as it signifies that sometimes no matter what trials we endure, God is with us - so we might as well surrender and 'pray and smile'.

Help Make A Difference

Shortly after St. Jeanne Jugan opened her third Home in Dinan, France in August of 1846, she was visited by an English tourist who later wrote an article about the encounter in the English press. "She never knew on any given day where the next provisions would come from, but she persevered, in the firm conviction that God would never abandon the poor... everything we do for them we do for Our Lord, Jesus Christ."

Present day Catholic author and theologian George Weigel described what he saw when visiting one of our Homes, "Elderly men and women with no one else to care for them are given exquisite attention; the dignity of every Resident is honored, no matter how difficult that dignity may be to discern amidst the trials of senility and disease. The Little Sisters of the Poor and their Residents are living reminders that there are no disposable human beings; that everyone is a someone for whom the Son of God entered the world, suffered and died; and that we read others out of the human family at our moral and political peril."

Are you looking for a way to make a difference in the lives of the elderly? Bequests have been one of the most meaningful sources of funds for our ministry. Through the foresight and generosity of others, we have been blessed to continue our work with the aged.

Estate gifts can be made through wills, living trusts, charitable remainder trusts, life insurance policy or IRAs.

The simplest way to designate a gift is by stating, "I give to the Little Sisters of the Poor Palatine, Inc to be used at their discretion, the following gift..."

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Some examples:

- •____ % (amount in percent) of my estate
- •The residual of my estate (after other gifts)
- •Specific stock, property, policy or asset

There may also be tax benefits that come from your gift, such as an income tax deduction, and avoiding capital gain and/or estate taxes (check with your tax professional for specific advice). Planning ahead can benefit you as well as our work, making a difference in the lives of the elderly.


Amazing Grace Gala
